

# Scammers Cashing in on COVID-19

## DON'T POST YOUR VACCINATION CARD ON SOCIAL MEDIA

Your vaccination card has information on it including your full name, date of birth, where you got your vaccine, and the dates you got it. When you post it on social media, you may be handing valuable information over to someone who could use it for identity theft.

## BE CAUTIOUS OF COVID-19 SURVEYS.

Do not give your personal, medical, or financial information to anyone claiming to offer money or gifts in exchange for your participation in a survey.

## IGNORE UNKNOWN CONTACTS.

Nobody legit will contact you by phone, email, text message, or social media to ask for personal identification information.

## HANG UP ON ROBOCALLS.

Scammers are using illegal robocalls to pitch everything from low-priced health insurance to work-at-home schemes.

## IGNORE SALES ADS.

You can't buy it – anywhere. The vaccine is only available at federal and state approved locations.
